Introduction

Welcome to the Marlboro Middle School! We know that you will make a sincere effort to do your best to take advantage of the educational opportunities that we have to offer. To help you be successful, we have provided you with this Agenda. It will help you develop good organizational skills and study habits.

General Guidelines

After School Activities and Events- Students attending any after school activity or event as a non-participant must be accompanied by a parent unless otherwise noted. Prior notice will be given for all events that do not necessitate parental accompaniment. Please refer to the “sports teams” and “clubs” schedule links on our school home page for the most up-to-date information.

Dress Code – We, at Marlboro Middle School, are proud of our students – their conduct, maturity and attire. Students are urged to emphasize cleanliness, neatness, and acceptable good taste in their dress and grooming habits. All student attire should be appropriate for a school environment.

1. All school attire should be neat and clean.
2. Beach or shower-type footwear flip-flops, backless shoes are not acceptable and should not be worn.
3. Short-shorts, cut-offs, holes/ripped jeans, tank tops, half shirts/blouses, mesh or net skirts/shirts/blouses, hats, tube tops, and halters **are not acceptable**. Shorts must be of at least mid-thigh length.
4. Graphics and apparel that suggest obscene or offensive messages are prohibited.
5. Pajamas and other such sleepwear are unacceptable.
6. Outdoor coats may not be worn in school.
7. Aerosol containers of any kind are not permitted in school. Examples include deodorants, body sprays or perfumes.
8. Physical Education attire must be school appropriate.

NOTE: Students may wear appropriate head coverings for religious or medical purposes only.

The administration reserves the right to have students change, cover, or remove inappropriate attire. Any student who is sent to the office for inappropriate dress will be required to call his/her family for a change of clothing. Repeat offenses will result in disciplinary action.

Books – The student is responsible for the proper care and use of textbooks and other assigned materials. Students are to write their names in all textbooks, including workbooks and sheet music. All books must be covered. Students will be charged full replacement cost for lost or damaged books.

Custodial Issues – Parents/guardians must notify the Marlboro Middle School in writing about any custodial/guardianship issues or any changes made affecting their children’s education.

Delivery of Forgotten Items – Forgotten books, homework assignments, lunches, and other items must be brought to the main office. During passing time, students will be called down to the office, which will minimize class interruptions. We cannot call students out of class to retrieve forgotten items. With the exception of lunch or eyeglasses, students will not be allowed to call home for forgotten items. Forgotten lunches brought to the school need to be clearly marked with student name and grade. Lunches will be deposited into appropriate bins in the lobby. The cafeteria aides will deliver lunches to students during the appropriate lunch period.

The main office can no longer lend students lunch money. If a student forgets his/her lunch money the cashier will charge their account for a standard lunch. Reimbursement should be sent in the following day.

Elevator Passes – If a student has an injury or illness that prevents him/her from using the stairs, the parent can request an elevator pass for one (1) day from the nurse. After the “one-day pass” a doctor’s note is required explaining the injury. No other students may enter or operate the elevator unless designated by a staff member as a helper for a student. No more than 4 students are allowed in an elevator at a time.

Handbook (Agenda) – This full-page, spiral bound homework assignment book will be issued to all students. All students are required to use it **daily**. If this homework assignment book is lost, a new one can be purchased for \$5.00 in the main office.

Health Services – Two nurses are assigned to the middle school. To ensure the health and safety of students, all medications must be brought to the nurse’s office – by a parent/guardian - for storage (between 7:35 – 8:00 A.M.). No medication will be administered without a doctor’s written authorization. The nurse will supervise those students who take medication. Please do not send your sick child to school with the intention of seeing the nurse. The nurses are here to provide assistance to a student when he/she becomes ill during the school day. Students may carry and self administer ONLY **rescue** medications, for example epi-pens or inhalers. These will be allowed only with proper medical documentation and signed parental waiver. Students are not permitted to carry any other medications.

Homework Requests for Absent Students – Students should have the telephone numbers of at least two classmates in each class. These classmates should be called to obtain homework assignments missed as a result of absences of **fewer** than three days. Students are also encouraged to check teacher web pages for homework assignments and other relevant information. When the student is absent for **three days**, the parent/guardian should contact the guidance department at **extension 6710** before 9:00 A.M. to request a summary of work missed. The summary will be available for pick-up at 2:30 P.M. on the day following the request.

Please note that families **CANNOT** leave homework requests on the answering machine when reporting an absence. The student services office must be contacted directly.

Hotline - The Marlboro Township Police Department has developed an anonymous hotline number for use by all residents and students to report any suspicious behavior or events. There is no caller ID attached to the line – it is completely anonymous and is manned 24 hours a day.

Lockers –Students will receive a locker with a combination lock for their exclusive use. They must be sure that the locker is completely closed and the **dial spun at least twice** to ensure that other students cannot gain access to the lockers. Locker problems should be reported to the main office. Students are not to share lockers or locker combinations with anyone.

Students will be assigned specific times to visit their lockers throughout the day. Notebooks, textbooks, cell phones and lunches are to be stored in lockers.

NOTE: Lockers are Board of Education property. The administration reserves the right to conduct periodic inspections of student lockers and contents.

Personal Property – Students are not to bring large sums of money or valuable items to school. The school district cannot assume responsibility in the event of loss, theft or damage to personal property.

Physical Education Excuses – Students requiring excuses from physical education should report to the school nurse before homeroom. Students may be excused for up to two days with a parent/guardian note. For more than two days, a physician's note is required. MD notes with language such as “until further notice” will excuse students for thirty days. After that time, notes must be updated. Physical Education lockers must be emptied at the end of each period.

Telephone Messages for Students – Only **emergency** messages from parents/guardians are passed to the student. The messages will be given to students by calling them to the office during passing time. Students may have a pass during lunch periods to use the school phones in the main office. Calls should be made to parents on an **emergency basis only.**

Students are **not permitted** to make or receive cellular phone calls, text messages or cellular phone pictures during the school day, or during any school-sponsored activity. They are not permitted to photograph or videotape other students using their cellular phone or any device with recording capability.

All general messages pertaining to your child should be sent to all three secretaries in the main office. Rmagrini@mtps.org, Klonie@mtps.org, and Elevinson@mtps.org. Other messages should be sent to the specific department or person directly.

Cell Phones

Students in the middle school are permitted to bring cell phones to school. For the purpose of this policy, “phones” shall also include all other electronic devices providing text messaging. All phones shall be **turned off** while the pupil is in school, on a school bus, or at a school-sponsored event. Pupils on class trips may not use phones without the permission of the teacher or administrator. **Pupils who use their phones while they are in school, on a school bus, or at a school-sponsored event shall have their phones confiscated and shall be subject to disciplinary action. Confiscated cell phones may be returned only to the PARENT/GUARDIAN.** Repeat offenders shall be subject to the district's student discipline code.

ATTENDANCE / DISMISSAL

A. Student Attendance And Absence

1. To be considered present for a full school day, a student must complete a minimum of four (4) hours. **In order to be eligible to participate in any after-school activity students must be present for at least four (4) hours, which must include the entire 8th period.** Once a student is signed out, they may not be able to return for after-school activities.
2. Regular attendance is defined as being present for all classes.
3. The Board of Education assumes responsibility for upholding the law requiring regular school attendance of each child resident in the district until he/she completes the eighth grade. Court proceedings will be initiated in cases of flagrant violations (N.J.S.A. 18A:38-1). This attendance may be in the schools of the district or in an out-of-district placement in which the instruction is equivalent to that of the public school.
4. **Attendance is expected during the days and time the school is in session unless the parent contacts the automated attendance system (732-972-2100 ext.6717) prior to the beginning of the school day. Parents must notify the school that the child is absent and provide the child's name, grade, and reason for not attending school. A note must be sent to the main office immediately following the absence stating the reason for the absence**
 - personal illness;
 - illness or death in the immediate family;
 - attendance required in court;
 - religious holiday; or
 - any other reason with the permission of the building principal.**Absence from school disqualifies students from participating in after-school programs, activities, and events for that school day.** Any absence not excused by a parental note or telephone call shall be sufficient reason for a check of the home by a school representative.
5. A pupil must be in attendance for 165 or more school days in each school year in order to be considered to have successfully completed the instructional program requirements of the grade/course to which he/she is assigned.

Early Dismissal

Dismissal to Parents – When a student must be picked up during school hours, a note **must** be sent to school. The student should bring the note to the main office after reporting to their homeroom. A pass will be issued for the student to leave class at the indicated time. Students **will not be called out of class**. Attending all classes is important, therefore, class attendance is taken each period. We monitor attendance daily not only for full day absences but also for class period absences. Please make every effort to schedule medical appointments after the school day. Every class is important, including 8th period. Due to academic and transportation concerns, we ask that students not be picked up from school between 2:00 and 2:15 PM., unless there is an emergency. Lobby Guard will be utilized to sign students out of school. Parent/Guardian must show a valid driver's license.

Dismissal to Other Individuals – Students will not be released to other individuals such as adult friends of the family, adult siblings, or the parents of other children without **written** authorization from the parent and approval by administration.

Pupil Late Arrivals

If arriving late, parent must park in parking lot and accompany their student into the lobby to sign in. Unless supervised by a parent or guardian, pupils may not be in the school or on school property before the start of the school day, unless a teacher has arranged to meet them in the main office. The school cannot be responsible for the safety of any pupils dropped off at school prior to bus arrival time.

The following are rules and regulations concerning student attendance.

1. **Definitions:**

- a. Where parents are separated or divorced, "parent" means the person or agency that has legal custody of the student. However, both parents are entitled to receive notices and information upon request providing the requester has not had parental rights terminated by a court of appropriate jurisdiction.
- b. The "school day" means that students must complete four (4) hours of school to be considered present for the entire day.
- c. Absence from school" is defined as non-attendance in regular classes and assigned locations for the entire school day. Absence from school is either excused or unexcused.

d. **Reasons for excused absences:**

- a. Disabling illness or injury
- b. Recovery from accident
- c. Required court attendance
- d. Death in the family
- e. Religious observance - In accordance with statute, no student absent for religious observance of a day recognized by the commissioner of education or this board of education shall be charged with an unexcused absence, deprived of an award or eligibility/opportunity to compete for an award, or of the right to take an alternate to a test or examination missed through such absence.
- f. Such good cause as may be acceptable to the principal

2. **Late arrival to or early release from school** will be excused with documentation at time of arrival for the following reasons including, but not limited to:

- a. Medical or dental appointments which cannot be scheduled outside of school hours
- b. Disabling illness or injury
- c. Family emergency
- d. Required Court appearance
- e. Death in Family
- f. Religious observance
- g. Such good cause as may be acceptable to the principal

3. Any absence or tardiness not excused by a parental note or telephone call shall be sufficient reason for a check of the home by a school representative.

4. Court proceedings may be initiated in cases of flagrant violations (N.J.S.A. 18A:38-27 through 29).

B. Issues Particular to Middle School

1. In the Middle School, cutting, which is defined as any unexcused absence from school or class(es)/assigned location(s) while being present for the school day or selectively missing classes/assigned location(s) as a result of deliberately missing homeroom. Cutting of an assigned location (class, study, lunch, etc.) will result in assignment to after-school detention.

2. In the Middle School, "late to class" is defined as not being at an assigned room/class/seat by the time the bell rings to begin the class. Initial lateness will be handled by the teacher. Subsequent lateness will be referred to administration. Lateness to class should be handled by the teacher via a parent/guardian conference. Tardiness to school is defined as not being in one's assigned class by the time the bell rings. On a student's sixth (6th) unexcused tardy, he or she will be assigned to one (1) in-school detention. Each subsequent unexcused tardy will result in additional disciplinary consequences, including possible assignment to the Saturday School Detention Program.

MISCELLANEOUS INFORMATION

CAFETERIA RULES

Students have only twenty-five minutes to eat lunch; therefore, cooperation with adults (teachers and aides) is necessary. Some basic guidelines include:

1. Do not throw food or other objects, and keep your table and surrounding areas clean.
2. Sign-out and get a pass from the teacher to leave the cafeteria. All students must have a signed pass from a teacher to leave the cafeteria. All students must sign out from the appropriate cafeteria, even if they bring a lunch from home before attending extra help, lunch detention, library, etc. (YOU MAY NOT VISIT THE OTHER CAFETERIA)
3. No fighting, name calling, teasing, profanity, or borrowing money.
4. Students may buy food or drink only during their assigned lunch period.
5. No student is permitted to leave the cafeteria with food or drink without adult authorization.

MOVEMENT THROUGH THE HALLS

Arrival, Dismissal, and Locker Time

Students must leave the locker areas in the morning and be on time to homerooms and/or period one classes to have their attendance taken.

General Movement in the Halls

1. In the interest of safety, students are required **to stay to the right** when moving through areas with two-way traffic. Doors are marked with Green or Red Circles to indicate the direction of movement and staying to the right.
2. Students may not enter bathrooms during the passing time between periods. They must report to their next class and obtain a pass from their next teacher.

INCLEMENT WEATHER PROCEDURES

Delayed Openings or School Closings

When inclement weather is severe enough to cause a delayed opening or the closing of school for the day, the district's website, www.marlboro.k12.nj.us will provide immediate information. You may call the administration building's main telephone number 732-972-2000 for a pre-recorded message concerning school closing or delayed openings. Additionally, a recorded message will call you.

Early Closings

Occasionally, it becomes necessary, once school is in session, to close before the regular dismissal time. Announcements will be made through the abovementioned Internet site, radio and television stations.

HANDBOOK OF PUPIL CONDUCT AND DISCIPLINE

The goal of a thorough and efficient education is to provide all children the educational opportunity that will prepare them to function politically, economically, and socially in a democratic society. The Marlboro Township School District recognizes the need for establishing student expectations.

This code of student conduct shall be reviewed annually and maintained by a committee. The members of the committee shall include parents, guardians and students, the superintendent, members of the board of education and community members. The committee may also include teachers and others staff and administrators as desired or required.

The board believes that an effective instructional program requires an orderly school environment and that the effectiveness of the educational program is, in part, reflected in the behavior of students.

The board of education expects students to conduct themselves in keeping with their level of maturity, with a proper regard for the rights and welfare of other students, for school personnel, for the educational purpose underlying all school activities, and for the care of school facilities and equipment. **Students are required to conform to reasonable standards of socially acceptable behavior; respect the person, property and rights of others; obey constituted authority and respond to those who hold that authority.**

The chief school administrator shall develop and implement, and the Board shall adopt a code of student conduct which establishes standards, policies and procedures for positive student development and student behavioral expectations on school grounds, including on a school bus or at school sponsored functions and, as appropriate, for conduct away from school grounds. The chief school administrator has the right and authority to impose a consequence on a student for conduct away from school grounds that is consistent with the board's approved code of student conduct.

This authority shall be exercised only when it is reasonably necessary for the student's physical or emotional safety, security and well-being or for reasons relating to the safety, security and well-being of other students, staff or school grounds, and when the conduct which is the subject of the proposed consequence materially and substantially interferes with the requirements of appropriate discipline in the operation of the school.

The following regulations are intended to clarify the position of the board of education and the administration with regard to conduct and discipline.

The Marlboro Township Board of Education and the administrative staff believe that a safe and secure atmosphere in the classroom and in the school is essential if:

1. Students are to learn to the maximum of their capacity.
2. Teachers are to do their best.
3. Good relations with the community are to be upheld, and
4. The total school operation is to be carried on in the best manner possible.

Additionally, the board of education adopts the following statements and strongly supports the school administration and the staff in establishing procedures that will ensure a school setting that will promote the best learning atmosphere in addition to providing the safest condition within the school for all children:

1. The area of student discipline is one that directly affects the total purpose and the total achievement of the school. It is an area that reflects the combined responsibilities of everyone.
2. Helping to establish a desirable teaching/learning situation is the work of many people – parents/guardians, students, teachers, administrators, and members of the board of education. Even the community is involved, because the habits learned at home and condoned in the schools will be carried over into private and community life.
3. Students who disrupt classes or conduct themselves in a manner that may be injurious to others will be disciplined as appropriate.

Six Pillars of Character

The district educational programs shall strive to reinforce character development in the students so that they can gain leadership skills. The students of this district shall be encouraged to develop the following competencies:

1. **Trustworthiness**
Students will develop appreciation of trustworthiness. Students will understand that genuine sincerity, personal morality, and trust in deeds and words must be realized in order to demonstrate trustworthiness.
2. **Citizenship**
Students will develop appreciation of civic virtue and citizenship. Students will understand the importance of not only knowledge and respect for the law, but the duty to give to society more than one takes.
3. **Responsibility**
Students will develop appreciation of responsibility. Students will understand how all behaviors are accountable and those rights require responsibilities to participate as active citizens in our democratic constitutional system of government.

4. **Respect**
Students will develop appreciation of respect. Students will understand that genuine respect requires that we all have a moral obligation to honor the essential worth and dignity of the individual, including oneself. We have a responsibility to be the best we can be in all situations.

5. **Caring**
Students will develop appreciation of caring. Students will understand that caring is the heart of ethics and is demonstrated in how we show our emotional concern toward all people.

6. **Fairness**
Students will develop appreciation of justice and fairness. Students will understand that a just and fair person considers all points of view, listens to others, and balances truth in light of evidence.

The Marlboro Township School District standards of character education are an essential component of the district's code of conduct. The board believes with appropriate infusion of character education into our curriculum, modeling of appropriate behavior by adults; support and assistance of students in school, the community and home; our students will achieve the above standards of character education.

EXPECTATIONS AND RIGHTS OF THE STUDENTS

A. EXPECTATIONS

To promote an environment for positive student development and achievement that enhances learning and leads to lifelong success, students are encouraged to emulate the following expectations:

1. Students prepare themselves mentally and physically for the process of learning.
2. Students are nourished, rested, clean, properly dressed and groomed.
3. Students are free of drugs and alcohol.
4. Students come to school prepared to learn.
5. Students demonstrate respect for people and property.
6. Students are honest, courteous and polite.
7. Students respect the property of others.
8. Students accept the rights of others to their own opinions.
9. Students settle differences peacefully.
10. Students display good sportsmanship at school-related functions.
11. Students participate in the maintenance and cleanliness of school facilities and property.
12. Students take responsibility for their own behavior and learning.
13. Students recognize that school is work and academic development is the primary purpose.
14. Students complete all homework, class work and exams.
15. Students make personal choices based on reasonable decision making processes.

16. Students learn to accept constructive criticism and disagreement when necessary and appropriate.
17. Students accept the consequences of their actions.
18. Students attend school regularly and punctually.
19. Students use library time for school work.
20. Students use books and other equipment appropriately.
21. Students share responsibilities when working as members of a group.
22. Students cooperate, contribute and share in the work of the group.
23. Students accept and assume leadership when appropriate.
24. Students listen to the points of view of others.
25. Students comply with the authority of teachers and administrators and obey school rules and regulations. Students report acts of harassment, intimidation or bullying, either personally or anonymously, to a person in authority.

B. RIGHTS OF STUDENTS

All students shall have the right to participate in the approved middle school program regardless of physical condition and shall receive:

1. Advance notice of behaviors that will result in suspension and expulsion;
2. Education that supports student development toward becoming a productive citizen;
3. A safe and secure school environment;
4. Due process and appeal procedures;
5. All notifications as required by law;
6. Records and privacy protection established by law and board policy.

SCHOOL RULES AND REGULATIONS

Rules and regulations are a necessary part of life in our society. Rules are established for the safety, protection and well-being of all concerned. So, it is in a school -- rules and regulations are designed not to hamper, but to constructively help each and every member of the school family - students, teachers, and parents/guardians. Students are charged with knowing the few but important rules and regulations. Doing so will lead to a more pleasant school experience for all.

The following school rules and regulations have been established to promote good school organization and to ensure the safety and well being of all pupils and school personnel. These rules and regulations apply to the school bus and cafeteria as well as the school building and grounds. They also apply at any time when pupils represent the Marlboro Township School District on trips, sports events, dances, and other school-sponsored activities.

Conduct that shall constitute good cause for disciplinary action shall include, but not be limited to, any of the following:

- continued and willful disobedience, or open defiance of the authority of any teacher or person having authority over a pupil;

- actions that constitute a danger to the physical well-being of other pupils or staff;
- physical assault upon or fight with, another pupil or teacher, other school employee or board member;
- taking, or attempting to take, personal property or money from another pupil whether by force or fear or theft;
- willfully causing (or attempting to cause) substantial damage to school property;
- taking part in any unauthorized occupancy of a district facility and refusing to leave promptly when directed to do so by a person in authority;
- incitement which is intended to and does result in unauthorized occupation by any group of pupils or others, of any part of a school or other facility owned by the district;
- incitement which is intended to and does result in truancy by other pupils ;
- leaving school without permission;
- possession of contraband;
- use or possession of unsafe or illegal articles including any device or instrument that can reasonably be construed to be a dangerous weapon, which includes, but is not limited to, those items enumerated in NJSA 2C:39-1 (r);
- use, possession, or sale of a controlled dangerous substance or alcohol;
- use of profanity or abusive language, or the wearing of articles of clothing that are provocative or have sexually explicit, obscene, vulgar, or profane words or renderings;
- tampering with or damaging property of other pupils or staff members;
- selling or buying lottery tickets or any other gambling paraphernalia on school property;
- harassment, intimidation or bullying;
- use of computer technology, the internet or e-mail that has the effect of threatening, abusing, intimidating, or harassing any or all pupils and/or staff members;
- habitually cutting class(es);
- smoking on school grounds or at bus stop;
- opening or entering another pupil's locker without his/her permission;
- willfully damaging walls, furniture, equipment, textbooks, or any property belonging to the school, faculty, or other pupils;
- stealing of any property belonging to the school, faculty, or other pupils;
- setting fires in or around school buildings or on buses;
- reporting by telephone, in writing, or in person, a threat known to be false, or setting off false fire alarms;
- being habitually tardy to school;
- forging parent(s) names and/or altering school related documents;
- manifesting behavior that is disruptive of the school program, especially where such disruption interferes with the educational program of other students;

- incorrigibility as evidenced by inability to abide by specified school rules in spite of previous disciplinary or rehabilitative efforts;
- cheating;
- falsely accusing someone of harassment, intimidation, or bullying;
- use of cellular phones.

TRANSPORTATION

Assignments – All students must use school transportation coming to and going from school and must board their assigned buses. **Due to space constraints on the buses, requests for temporary changes in bus assignments are NOT granted.** Students must get off the bus **only** at their assigned stop.

Safety and Conduct on the Buses – Students are required to exhibit proper conduct while waiting for the bus and when on the bus. The bus driver is in charge and is to be treated in a respectful manner. Students should not engage in activities that distract the bus driver. Activities such as the unauthorized opening of bus windows, placing arms or hands and/or leaning out of windows may result in suspension from the bus or from school.

Bus Behavior Rules And Regulations

1. Students shall conduct themselves in an orderly manner at all times. Any violations of these rules may result in the suspension of transportation privileges.
2. Students must adhere to the assigned bus schedule and board buses at the end of the school day. Students found waiting for pickups will be told to board their assigned buses.
3. Parents/guardians may pick up their children at the end of the school day by coming to the main office or other designated area and signing their child out of school.
4. Once a student has boarded the bus, he/she may not be released to a parent/guardian by the bus driver without the authorization of the school administration.
5. Middle school students may bring cell phones to school; however, they shall not use or display them while on the school bus.
6. Students shall conduct themselves in an appropriate manner while waiting for the school bus. Playing in the streets, destruction of private property, fighting, etc., may result in the suspension of bus privileges, **or other disciplinary action.**
7. Students shall not engage the drivers in conversation or otherwise distract them from their duties **except in special circumstances.**
8. Students shall exhibit the same behavior on the school bus as if they were in class.
9. Students shall not eat or drink on the school bus.
10. **Students shall not bring food, other than lunches, onto the school bus.**
11. Students shall not throw books, paper, trash, etc. on the floor of the bus or from the windows of the bus.
12. Students shall remain in their assigned seats on the bus until the bus has come to a complete stop.

13. Students or their parents/guardians shall be financially responsible for any damage or vandalism of our buses.
14. Students shall ride on the bus assigned to them, unless they have written permission from the administration to do otherwise.
15. Students shall not be given special passes to accompany friends home via buses to which the student has not been assigned by the transportation coordinator.
16. Teachers shall review these regulations with their students on the first day of school and at intervals during the year.
17. Improper bus behavior, **including but not limited to harassment, intimidation and bullying** will be reported to the administration by the bus driver. The administration shall take appropriate action **that may include notification to parents/guardians.** Further offenses may result in other disciplinary action, including but not limited to the suspension of bus privileges.
18. Parents/guardians are advised to have children at the bus stop at least five (5) minutes before the scheduled pick-up time.
19. There can be no additional bus stops other than those that are regularly scheduled.
20. Students shall not at any time, extend their arms, hands, feet, or heads out of the windows of the bus.
21. Students shall obey the instructions of their driver at all times.
22. Students shall remain seated at all times while the bus is moving.
23. A stopped school bus is not an automatic "STOP" signal for other cars. Each student should look carefully to the left and right before crossing the road after getting off from the bus.
24. Students shall not bring large objects or glass containers on the school bus unless sanctioned by the school district.
25. Parents/guardians are requested to discuss these rules with their children.
26. In addition to the behaviors mentioned above, all students shall be expected to behave on the school bus as if they were on school premises or at school sponsored functions.

HARASSMENT, INTIMIDATION OR BULLYING

“Harassment, intimidation or bullying” is defined as any gesture, any written, verbal or physical act, or any electronic communication, whether it be a single incident or a series of incidents, that is reasonably perceived as being motivated either by any actual or perceived characteristic, such as race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, or a mental, physical or sensory disability, or by any other distinguishing characteristic, that takes place on school grounds, at any school-sponsored function or on a school bus, or off school grounds, in accordance with law, that substantially disrupts or interferes with the orderly operation of the school or the rights of other students, and that:

- A. A reasonable person should know, under the circumstances, will have the effect of physically or emotionally harming a student or damaging the student's property, or placing a student in reasonable fear of physical or emotional harm to his/her person or damage to his/her property; or
- B. Has the effect of insulting or demeaning any student or group of students; or
- C. Creates a hostile educational environment for the student by interfering with the student's education or by severely or pervasively causing physical or emotional harm to the student.

"Electronic communication" means a communication that is transmitted by means of an electronic device, including, but not limited to a telephone, cellular phone, computer, or pager.

DISCIPLINE PROCEDURES

PLEASE NOTE THAT PUPIL DISCIPLINE RECORDS, AS DEFINED BY THIS POLICY, SHALL BE KEPT IN THE PUPIL'S FILE UNTIL THE PUPIL GRADUATES OR TRANSFERS OUT OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT, AT WHICH TIME THE RECORDS WILL BE FORWARDED IN ACCORDANCE WITH BOARD POLICY, REGULATIONS AND LAW.

Step One: First Violation

The teacher will talk with the student in private and attempt to resolve the problem.

Step Two: Second Violation

- a) The teacher may contact parents, guidance, and administration.
- b) The student should be made aware of the consequences of the third violation.

Step Three: Third Violation

The teacher will:

- a) Refer the student for administrative action.
- b) Establish contact with student and parents. **Saturday school and out-of-school suspension may be initiated at any step.**

"All detention notices are to be signed and returned to the Vice Principal the following school day. In the event you are unable to pick up your child at 4:00 p.m. you can pre-register for Champions After Care by calling [732-407-3662](tel:732-407-3662) or [732-536-2459](tel:732-536-2459). Registration must be completed in advance and once registered students can "Drop In" anytime. Pick up for Champions After Care program is at Door 17 by the A side Cafeteria."

SUSPENSION AND EXPULSION

The Board of Education recognizes that suspension or expulsion of a student represents serious action and should not be taken unless there is a reasonable cause to believe that a student has materially and substantially interfered with the maintenance of good order in the school, or that such action is reasonably necessary for the physical and emotional safety and well-being of the student or for the safety of other members of the school community.

A suspended student shall be permitted to complete any and all assignments. No student shall be denied the right to take a test nor shall be failed in an assignment as a consequence of his/her suspension. Any suspension which exceeds four (4) days will result in home instruction.

Any student involved in continued and willful disobedience or of open defiance of the authority over him/her, or of the habitual use of profanity, or of obscene language, or who shall cut, deface or otherwise injure any school property shall be liable to punishment and to suspension or expulsion from school.

SATURDAY SCHOOL

Middle School Saturday School Program –

Before imposing an in-school or out-of-school suspension, the administration may require participation in the Middle School Saturday Program as an alternative form of discipline. The criteria for assignment to the program and procedures are set forth in the regulations of the Board.

Criteria for Assignment:

A student may be assigned to Saturday School for any of the following situations:

- 1. Any basis upon which a suspension may be imposed (insubordination, bus code violation, cutting classes or after school detention).
- 2. Any incident of sufficient gravity.
- 3. More than three assigned detentions over a period of five months may result in the assignment of one day to the Saturday School program.
- 4. In the case of assignment to three Saturday School sessions, any subsequent incident that would ordinarily have carried a Saturday School consequence will result in suspension from school.

Internet Student Acceptable Use Policy

The Marlboro Township Public School District offers Internet access for student use. This document contains the Acceptable Use Policy for your use of the District's Educational Computer Network (the "Network").

A. Educational Purpose

- 1. The District's Network has been established for educational purposes, including classroom and curriculum-related activities.
- 2. The Network has not been established as a public access service or a public forum. The District has the right to place reasonable restrictions on the material you access or post through the Network. You are also expected to follow the rules set forth in the District's disciplinary code and state and federal law in your use of the District's Network.
- 3. You may not use the Network for commercial purposes or product advertisement. You may not offer, provide, or purchase products or services through the Network.
- 4. You may not use the Network for political lobbying. You may only use it to communicate with elected representatives and to express your opinion on political issues.

B. Student Internet Access

- 1. You will have access to the Internet through the District's Network, which links computers located in classrooms, the media center, and the computer labs.

2. You will have e-mail access only under a teacher's direct supervision using the teacher's account or an approved, temporary classroom account. You may be provided with a temporary individual e-mail account under special circumstances, at the request of a teacher and with the written approval of your parent/guardian.
3. You and your parent/guardian must sign an agreement to be granted permission to access the Internet through the District's Network. This agreement must be renewed on an annual basis. Your parent/guardian can withdraw their approval at any time. If you and/or your parent/guardian does not sign and return an agreement you will not be permitted to access the Internet through the District's Network.

C. Unacceptable Uses

The following uses of the District's Network are considered unacceptable:

1. Personal Safety

- a. You will not post personal contact information about yourself or other people. Personal contact information includes such things as your address, telephone number, school address, work address, e-mail address, etc.
- b. You will not agree to meet with someone you have met online without your parent's/guardian's written approval. Your parent/guardian should accompany you to this meeting.
- c. You will promptly disclose to a teacher or an administrator any message you receive that is inappropriate or makes you feel uncomfortable.

2. Illegal Activities

- a. You will not attempt to gain unauthorized access to the District's Network, or any other computer system through the District's Network or go beyond your authorized access. This includes attempting to log in through another person's account or accessing another person's files.
- b. You will not make deliberate attempts to disrupt the Network's performance or destroy data by spreading computer viruses or by any other means.
- c. You will not use the District's Network to engage in any illegal act, such as arranging for a drug sale or the purchase of alcohol, engaging in criminal gang activity, threatening the safety of a person, etc. Additionally, messages related to or in support of illegal activities may be reported to the federal, state and/or local authorities and may result in disciplinary action by the district, as well as potential criminal and/or civil punishment.
- d. You will not transmit, receive or use any material in violation of any federal, state or local regulation or law, including, but not limited to, copyrighted or licensed material, threatening or obscene material, or material protected by trade secrets.

3. Network Security

- a. You are responsible for your individual account and should take all reasonable precautions to prevent others from being able to use your account. Under no conditions should you provide your password to another person.
- b. You will immediately notify a teacher or administrator if you have identified a possible security problem. Do not show the possible security problem to another student. Do not go looking for security problems. This may be construed as an illegal attempt to gain access to the District's Network.
- c. You will avoid the inadvertent spread of computer viruses by following the District's virus protection procedures if you download software.

4. Inappropriate Language

- a. You will not use obscene, profane, lewd, vulgar, rude, inflammatory, threatening, or disrespectful language on the District's Network.
- b. You will not post on the District's Network information that, if acted upon, could cause damage or a danger of disruption to the classroom or the District's operations.
- c. You will not engage in personal attacks, including prejudicial or discriminatory attacks on the District's Network.
- d. You will not harass another person on the District's Network. Harassment is persistently acting in a manner that distresses or annoys another person. If you are told by a person to stop sending them harassment-type messages, you must stop.
- e. You will not knowingly or recklessly post false or defamatory information about a person or organization on the District's Network.

5. Respect for Privacy

- a. You will not repost on the District's Network a message that was sent to you privately without permission of the person who sent you the message.
- b. You will not post private information about another person on the District's Network.

6. Respecting Resource Limits

- a. You will use the District's Network only for educational activities.
- b. You will not download large files unless absolutely necessary. If necessary, you will download the file at a time when the Network is not being heavily used.
- c. You will not post chain letters or engage in spamming, which is defined as sending an annoying or unnecessary message to a large number of people.
- d. You will check your e-mail frequently and delete unwanted messages promptly if you have been granted an e-mail account.
- e. You will subscribe only to high quality discussion group mail lists that are relevant to your education.

7. Plagiarism and Copyright Infringement

- a. You will not plagiarize works that you find on the Internet. Plagiarism is taking the ideas or writings of others and presenting them as if they were your own. You must give credit where credit is due.
- b. You will respect the rights of copyright owners. Copyright infringement occurs when you inappropriately reproduce a work that is protected by a copyright. If a work contains language that specifies appropriate use of that work, you should follow the expressed requirements. If you are unsure whether or not you can use a work, you should request permission from the copyright owner. Copyright law can be very confusing. If you have questions, ask a teacher.

8. Inappropriate Access to Material

- a. You will not use the Network to access material that is profane or obscene (for example, pornography), that advocates illegal acts, or that advocates violence or discrimination towards other people (for example, hate literature). A special exception may be made for hate literature if the purpose of your access is to conduct research, and both your teacher and parent have approved in writing.
- b. If you mistakenly access inappropriate information, you should immediately tell your teacher or administrator. This will protect you against a claim that you have intentionally violated this Policy.
- c. Your parents should instruct you if there is additional material that they think it would be inappropriate for you to access. The District fully expects that you will follow your parent's/guardian's instructions in this matter.

D. Your Rights

1. Free Speech

- a. Your right to free speech, as set forth in the District's disciplinary code, applies also to your communication on the District's Network and the Internet. The Network is considered a limited forum, similar to a school newspaper, and, therefore, the District may restrict your speech for valid educational reasons. However, the District will not restrict your speech on the basis of a disagreement with the opinions you are expressing.

2. Search and Seizure

- a. You should not expect privacy in regard to the contents of your computer files stored on the District's Network. The situation is similar to the rights you have in the privacy of your locker.
- b. You should be aware that when you connect to the Internet, the names of the sites you are visiting are recorded on a Network server.
- c. Routine maintenance and monitoring of the Network may lead to discovery that you have violated this policy, the District's disciplinary code, or the law.

- d. An individual search of your computer files, the e-mails you send and/or receive and the sites on the Internet which you have visited will be conducted if there is reasonable suspicion that you have violated this policy, the District's disciplinary code, or any federal, state or local law. The investigation will be reasonable and related to the suspected violation, but you should be aware that your computer files are not private and could be examined by a teacher or administrator.
- e. Your parents have the right at any time to request to see the contents of your computer files.

3. Due Process

- a. The District will cooperate fully with local, state, and/or federal officials in any investigation related to any illegal activities conducted through the District's Network.
- b. In the event there is a claim that you have violated this policy, the District's disciplinary code or any federal, state or local law in your use of the Network, you will be provided with a written notice of the suspected violation and you will be given an opportunity to present an explanation before an administrator.
- c. If the violation also involves a violation of other provisions of the District's disciplinary code, it will be handled in a manner described in the disciplinary code. Additional restrictions may be placed on your use of your Internet account. However, irrespective of any disciplinary action which the District may take against you, your actions may also subject you to civil and/or criminal punishment.

E. Limitation of Liability

The District makes no guarantee that the functions or the services provided by or through the District's Network will be error-free or without defect. The District will not be responsible for any damage you may suffer, including, but not limited to, loss of data or interruptions of service. The District is not responsible for the accuracy or quality of the information obtained through or stored on the Network. The District will not be responsible for financial obligations arising through and/or related to your unauthorized use of the Network.

F. Personal Responsibility

When you are using the District's Network, it may feel like you can more easily break a rule and not get caught. This is not really true, because whenever you do something on a network you leave little "electronic footprints," so the odds of getting caught are really about the same as they are in the real world.

The fact that you can do something or think you can do something without being caught does not make it right to do so. Even if you don't get caught, there is always one person who will know whether you have done wrong -- and that person is you. Your use of the Internet can be a mirror that will show you what kind of a person you are.

CONDUCT/DISCIPLINE

Below is a Chart of Student Discipline listing school responses to violations of behavioral expectations. The penalties set forth below shall serve as a guideline. The administration reserves the right to deviate from these penalties based upon the facts and circumstances of each case. These behavioral expectations and school responses include, but are not limited to:

ADMINISTRATIVE DISCIPLINE GUIDELINES – THE ADMINISTRATOR OF THE SCHOOL BUILDING MAY USE HIS/HER DISCRETION IN DETERMINING THE APPROPRIATE DISCIPLINING OF A PUPIL. NOTE: SATURDAY SCHOOL DETENTION IS ASSIGNED TO MIDDLE SCHOOL PUPILS ONLY.
